

# General Cultural Requirements

- Sun to Part Shade
- Rich, evenly moist, well-drained soils
- Acid to Neutral soils
- Moderate to high nutrient levels
- Avoid frost pockets

# To Prune or Not to Prune?




# Reasons to Prune

- 1) Winter damage
- 2) Aesthetics
  - Deadheading
  - Too Large
  - Irregular branching
- 3) Improved vigor/larger flowers

# Pruning Tips

Prune off old flower  
to just above the first  
pair of new buds



If frost damaged,  
prune to the first pair  
of healthy buds

Prune out old,  
non-producing stems  
to the plant base

# What's Wrong.... My Hydrangea Won't Flower!



# General Guidelines for When to Prune

Flower on Old Growth = Prune during early growing season (April – July)

Flower on New Growth = Prune during early growing season or when dormant (Dec. – March)

# On To The Plants!



*Hydrangea arborescens*  
Smooth Hydrangea



- Zone 3
- Eastern US Native
- 3-5' Tall, 4-8' Wide
- Terminal Flowers on New and Old Growth
- June – End of Summer






*Hydrangea paniculata*  
Panicle Hydrangea



- Japan and China Native
- Zone 3
- Large Shrub, Small Tree 10-25'
- Vigorous, Often Fountain-like
- White Flowers, July to end of Summer
- Flowers on New and Old Growth

*Hydrangea macrophylla*  
Bigleaf Hydrangea



- Native to Japan
- Zone 6 (5)
- Rounded shrubs 3-6' high and wide
- Pink, white or blue flowers
- Generally on old growth
- 300+ Cultivars!

# *Hydrangea serrata*



- Similar to *H. macrophylla*
- Slightly more cold hardy (Zone 5)
- Native to Japan and Korea
- Flower on older stems

*Hydrangea quercifolia*  
Oakleaf Hydrangea



- Zone 5
- Southeast US native
- Large shrubs, 4-8' Tall, 6-12' Wide
- Oak-like leaves
- White flowers, peak display in July
- Flowers on old growth

# *Hydrangea angustipetala*



- Zone 6
- Japan, China, Taiwan
- Variable, deciduous or evergreen
- rounded habit, 5-6'
- Lacecap flowers, late spring to early summer

# 'Mon Long Shou'





*Hydrangea aspera*  
Rough Leaf Hydrangea



- Zone 6 (5)
- Himalayas, China, Taiwan and beyond
- Upright to Mounding habit, 10-15'
- Lacecap flowers, peak display in July
- Flowers on both new and old stems
- Tolerant of high pH soils


